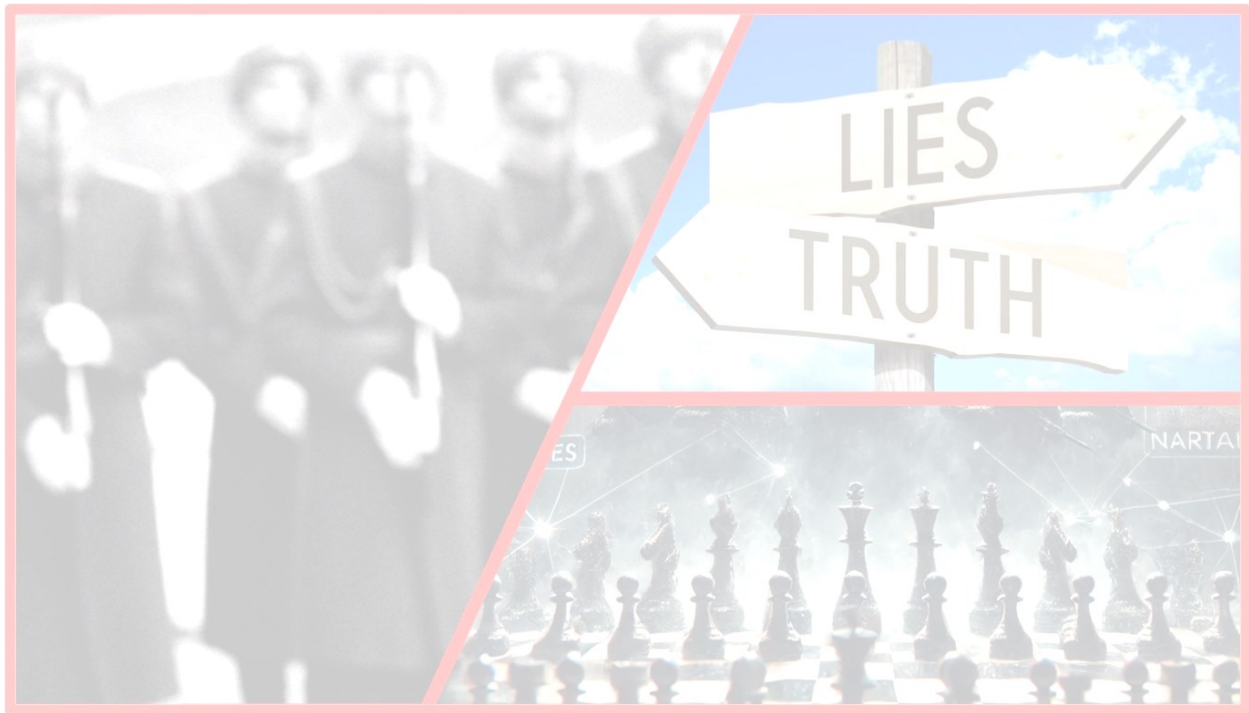


Analysis of Russian Hybrid Influence, Strategic Manipulation, and Emerging Threats in the Balkans

The operations leverage nationalist groups, Orthodox Church networks, and regional influencers to amplify narratives.

Russia employs a multi-layered approach combining disinformation, cyber-attacks, economic pressure, and soft power. It disseminates false or misleading narratives that exploit ethnic tensions, historical grievances, and anti-Western sentiment to disrupt NATO

and EU integration efforts. Tactics include AI-driven content, deepfakes, coordinated social media manipulation, and cultural diplomacy, targeting public trust and democratic processes.

The Russian operations create deep divisions within societies, weaken democratic institutions, and generate skepticism about NATO and the EU. Maintaining a state of strategic uncertainty, Russia obstructs reform processes, fosters instability, and keeps Balkan states politically fragmented and more susceptible to Russian influence. The campaigns also erode regional cohesion, complicate Western diplomatic efforts, and present a persistent security threat to the broader NATO alliance.

Geopolitical shifts drive the urgency of these operations --- accelerated NATO enlargement, EU accession talks, and increased Western military presence in the region. Russia's operations seek to preempt these developments by creating anti-Western sentiment and slowing integration processes. Additionally, the 2024 elections in key Balkan states present immediate opportunities for Russia to influence political outcomes and deepen divisions.

Moscow will continue exploiting weak state institutions and ethnic divisions to sustain long-term influence, making it critical for Western actors to implement integrated countermeasures that address disinformation and its underlying social drivers.

Russia's disinformation and cognitive warfare in the Balkans exemplify a hybrid approach that capitalizes on regional tensions, propaganda narratives, and automated dissemination, as detailed in the "Digest of the Center for Strategic Communications." The analysis below breaks down Russia's strategy and manipulative tactics while highlighting their broader geopolitical implications.

Russia's hybrid warfare and information campaigns are deeply interwoven with its broader geopolitical strategies, which include disrupting NATO expansion and EU integration, especially in the Balkans. Moscow's influence tactics range from economic engagement to covert disinformation, which spreads divisive narratives on various issues. Its methods of shaping narratives are often low-cost yet highly effective, using proxies and automated systems that create a pervasive media multiplier effect across regional media ecosystems.

The emergence of anti-Israel narratives is part of Russia's adaptive strategy to exploit existing geopolitical rifts. Redirecting attention to Israel-Iran tensions, Russian disinformation outlets generate confusion and amplify grievances in the Balkans, a region already rife with historical and ethnic divisions. The deployment of Serbian-language media outlets to spread Russian-aligned messages about the Iran-Israel conflict illustrates how Russian operatives use language-specific channels to penetrate local audiences.

The automated generation of pro-Russian narratives via bots and fake media accounts reflects Russia's long-standing use of cyber tools to amplify disinformation. The technique aligns with Russia's established cyber and information warfare playbook, which has been

used in conflicts like Ukraine. The "information drones" mentioned in the digest are emblematic of automated disinformation networks, where narratives are seeded and disseminated rapidly through coordinated bots.

The "Pravda" clones established in Balkan countries, noted for their automated content sharing, reflect Russia's proxy-based strategy to obscure origins and offer plausible deniability. The outlets, often imitating legitimate news sources, are designed to mislead Balkan audiences and create a false sense of credibility while promoting Russian geopolitical interests.

Russian disinformation campaigns in the Balkans also manipulate local media and political figures, integrating them into a broader ecosystem that disseminates Kremlin narratives under the guise of independent journalism. The alignment of Russian narratives with particular nationalist agendas in the region further entrenches Moscow's influence, as seen in Russia's support for political allies like Milorad Dodik in Bosnia.

Russia's information warfare strategy often revolves around the use of intermediary actors and deniable tactics, such as the disguised Serbian-language media channels noted in the anti-Israel campaign. The approach enables Russia to evade direct blame while maintaining strategic pressure on NATO and the EU.

Russia's expanding disinformation campaigns in the Balkans not only target regional stability but also aim to weaken EU cohesion and NATO's influence. Using the Balkans as a disinformation testing ground, Russia seeks to destabilize the broader European security architecture, using divisive narratives to create friction among EU and NATO members.

Russia's operations in the Balkans represent a broader effort to integrate disinformation into hybrid warfare strategies, emphasizing the seamless blending of digital propaganda, cyber tools, and local political manipulation. The adaptive nature of Russian tactics, evident in the shift toward anti-Israel narratives, underscores the need for proactive countermeasures by the West to protect the information space and ensure stability in vulnerable regions like the Balkans. The analysis exposes the manipulative core of Russia's cognitive warfare, where even a minor penetration of the information sphere can result in significant destabilization, particularly when compounded by geopolitical tensions.

Advanced psychological manipulation, new cyber vectors, and indirect strategies

Beyond mere disinformation, Russia's approach is anchored in a psychological warfare concept known as "reflexive controls," not just spreading false narratives but actively shaping the decision-making of target populations by preemptively guiding their

perceptions. Controlling the information flow, Russia pushes Balkan audiences to respond in ways favorable to Moscow's strategic interests, such as exacerbating ethnic tensions or increasing distrust towards NATO and the EU.

Ironically, Russia often uses “anti-fake news” campaigns to amplify its propaganda efforts in the Balkans. The campaigns claim to expose “Western lies” while spreading misleading or exaggerated narratives, which adds credibility to Moscow’s messages among skeptics of Western media. Presenting itself as the arbiter of truth, Russia exploits existing suspicions to divide public opinion further.

In addition to automated bot networks, Russia uses localized cyber tactics, such as *distributed denial-of-service* (DDoS) attacks against independent Balkan media or NGO websites that oppose Russian narratives. The attacks serve to silence dissenting voices and clear the information space for Moscow's narratives, a strategy consistent with Russian hybrid warfare seen in Ukraine and the Baltics.

Moscow’s disinformation campaigns leverage historical grievances, ethnic animosities, and religious differences across the Balkans, framing Russia as a defender of Orthodox Christianity and traditional values against perceived Western cultural imperialism. The strategy is especially effective in countries like Serbia and Montenegro, where anti-Western sentiments can be more easily activated.

Russia’s proxy networks extend beyond cloned media outlets; they include social media influencers, Telegram channels, and YouTube creators tailored to Serbian, Bosnian, and Macedonian audiences. Localizing its messaging and adapting content to specific language and cultural contexts, Russia maximizes the impact and reach of its campaigns.

Russia’s influence also extends to direct political interference, where Moscow funds pro-Russian parties or provides covert support to opposition movements that challenge pro-EU governments. The political manipulations often aim to derail EU accession efforts, a critical goal for Russia’s Balkan strategy.

Russia’s adaptation of new technologies, such as *deepfakes*, more sophisticated social media algorithms, and encrypted messaging apps, further enhances the sophistication of its disinformation campaigns. Deepfakes and AI-generated personas have become tools in the Balkans for creating more convincing false narratives tailored to resonate with local audiences and distrust Western media.

Although primarily an information warfare campaign, Russia’s influence is also sustained through economic dependencies, energy deals, investments in infrastructure, and financial support to political elites are used to create leverage, which Russia amplifies with strategic

messaging about its "reliable partnership." The narrative is then mirrored by Russian media proxies, creating a loop that reinforces pro-Russian sentiments and skepticism towards the EU.

Russia's cognitive warfare in the Balkans frequently involves the parallel promotion of alternative narratives that appeal to anti-globalist and nationalist sentiments. This includes anti-EU and anti-American conspiracy theories, often tied to broader themes like the decline of Western values and "global elite" plots. By introducing these competing narratives, Russia disrupts pro-Western messaging and fosters confusion and disarray within the local political landscape.

Russia's operations in the Balkans remain within the "gray zone" of conflict—avoiding direct military engagement but maintaining constant political, informational, and cyber pressure. The strategy allows Moscow to sustain influence without crossing thresholds that might provoke stronger Western countermeasures.

Russia has entrenched its influence in the Balkans by broadening its toolkit through psychological manipulation, covert cyber operations, and adaptive messaging strategies constantly evolving to exploit local vulnerabilities. The West's response requires a nuanced and multi-dimensional approach to counter these layered disinformation campaigns, bolster independent media, and reinforce cyber defenses.

Expanded view of Russian disinformation operations in the Balkans

Russia's disinformation efforts are often synchronized with other forms of hybrid warfare, including military provocations, cyberattacks, and economic coercion. The integrated approach blurs the lines between digital and physical domains, creating confusion and complicating the West's response. In the Balkans, this could manifest through the simultaneous dissemination of false narratives and cyber disruptions of election infrastructure, as seen in Ukraine and elsewhere.

Russia taps into regional narratives of victimhood, portraying itself as a liberator against NATO's and the EU's alleged encroachments. Emphasizing shared Orthodox Christian heritage and historical alliances, Moscow positions itself as a defender of traditional values and sovereignty, which resonates with specific segments of Balkan societies opposed to Western liberalism.

Russia has mastered using local actors, such as influencers, politicians, and journalists sympathetic to Moscow, to deliver Russian-aligned narratives. The local proxies are more trusted by domestic audiences and can frame disinformation as genuine national

discourse rather than external propaganda. The tactic increases the penetration of narratives that otherwise might be dismissed if delivered solely by Russian outlets.

A more aggressive form of cognitive warfare is what Russian strategists term “information terror”—flooding the information space with fear-inducing stories designed to polarize and demoralize the target audience. For example, Russia’s media can simultaneously push narratives of NATO militarization alongside fears of economic collapse due to Western sanctions, effectively amplifying societal anxiety.

Russia’s information warfare employs “active measures” as a long-term strategy to gradually reshape public perception rather than seeking immediate shifts. The tactic involves sustained engagement over time, slowly normalizing specific ideas, such as skepticism toward EU integration, or rehabilitating past pro-Russian figures in Balkan politics.

Russia actively exploits regional diplomatic platforms to amplify its narratives. For instance, by using its observer status in regional initiatives or multilateral events, Russia promotes its viewpoints under the guise of cooperative diplomacy. The narratives shared in these forums often go back into local media, gaining legitimacy as they appear to come from official discussions.

In the Balkans, Russia fosters alternative information ecosystems that challenge mainstream media narratives, such as messaging apps like Telegram, where channels are less regulated and can spread conspiracy theories more freely. Russia’s goal is to build parallel realities that persist despite factual counter-evidence.

Russia quickly exploits regional crises or sudden geopolitical shifts to push its narratives. During the recent Middle East conflicts, Russian media in the Balkans pivoted to cover events in ways that could provoke anti-Western sentiment, using the crisis as an opportunity to build narratives around Western failures or hypocrisy. The opportunistic narrative shift maintains momentum in the information space and keeps audiences engaged with Moscow's broader strategic messaging.

A core tactic in Russian cognitive warfare is creating “false equivalence” by equating NATO’s actions with aggression while framing Russian actions as defensive measures. In the Balkans, Russian media depict NATO troop movements or exercises as provocations while portraying Russian involvement as stabilizing interventions.

Beyond state-sponsored disinformation, Russia employs PMCs like Wagner or associated groups to conduct psychological operations that align with its narratives in the Balkans. The entities often engage in more hands-on influence, such as spreading fear of violence or

promising security, while pushing disinformation that serves Russia's broader geopolitical aims.

Russia's efforts in the Balkans are not just opportunistic but institutionally supported. Agencies like the GRU, SVR, and FSB provide resources, strategic guidance, and training to local actors who execute Moscow's disinformation plans. The actors are often embedded within the media, NGOs, or political parties, blurring the lines between civilian institutions and covert operatives.

Russia has started experimenting with augmented reality and AI tools to create even more convincing disinformation in the Balkans. Deepfakes, AI-generated avatars, and synthetic voice technologies generate more realistic propaganda videos and false testimonials, complicating efforts to identify and counter false information.

The evolving nature of Russia's tactics in the Balkans showcases its adaptive, multi-domain approach to cognitive warfare, combining cyber, psychological, and diplomatic tools to maximize impact. The West must adopt flexible, cross-domain countermeasures that address the full scope of Russia's influence in the region.

Exploring additional elements related to hybrid tools

One of Russia's more insidious tactics is to mix accurate news stories with disinformation in Balkan media outlets. Embedding false narratives within factual reporting, Russia makes its propaganda appear more credible and challenging to refute. The tactic is particularly effective in environments where trust in media is already low, as it makes audiences more susceptible to persuasive messaging cloaked in a semblance of truth.

Russia specifically targets NATO and EU missions in the Balkans by framing them as foreign occupiers rather than peacekeepers. The Kremlin's messaging often portrays these missions as being ineffective, imperialistic, or even corrupt, which erodes local support for Western institutions while fostering nationalist sentiment and alignment with Russian interests.

Energy dependence is a geopolitical tool and a narrative device for Russia. Russia's propaganda emphasizes its role as a "reliable" energy provider while portraying EU-backed energy diversification as unreliable and costly for Balkan states. Using energy as a lever and a narrative, Russia tries to tie economic security to political allegiance.

Russia has long leveraged Orthodox Christianity as a soft power tool, and in the Balkans, it actively works through church networks to promote narratives aligned with Russian geopolitics. The Russian Orthodox Church supports Kremlin narratives by framing Western

values as corrupt and antithetical to traditional culture, thereby fostering distrust in the EU and NATO.

Russia has begun employing psychographic profiling to tailor disinformation campaigns more precisely to Balkan audiences, data mining from social media and other digital sources to identify emotional triggers, cultural values, and personal biases, which are then exploited in highly targeted information operations. Russia can deliver more personalized and compelling narratives that resonate deeply with specific demographic segments.

Russian disinformation not only spreads false narratives but also creates the perception of imminent threats, such as fabricated rumors of ethnic violence or potential coups backed by NATO. The tactic destabilizes societies by making them overly cautious, skeptical of domestic and foreign leaders, and fearful of engaging in regional cooperation.

Russia frequently emphasizes the corruption of Western-backed Balkan leaders to undermine EU integration efforts. Russian narratives seek to turn public opinion against Western-supported reforms while presenting Russia as a purveyor of pragmatic, non-interventionist politics, framing pro-EU politicians as corrupt and self-serving.

Russia tries to foster “strategic ambiguity” about its role in regional conflicts by spreading contradictory messages about its involvement in the Balkans. For example, while state-controlled media may deny direct Russian interference, unofficial channels might boast about Moscow’s capacity to protect Russian-speaking minorities or to influence local elections positively. The ambiguity makes it difficult for external observers to counter Russian narratives effectively, as the messaging is fluid and adaptable to changing events.

Russia actively rewrites historical narratives in the Balkans to fit its strategic objectives. Portraying itself as a long-standing protector of Slavic nations and Orthodox Christianity, Russia tries to reshape historical perceptions to support its modern geopolitical agenda. Russia often displays or reinterprets its historical aggressions in the region while amplifying past conflicts involving Western powers.

Russia frequently employs humanitarian narratives, positioning itself as a rescuer during crises. The tactic has been used in response to natural disasters, where Russian aid is often coupled with extensive media coverage that portrays Western assistance as delayed or conditional. Such narratives help cultivate a positive perception of Russia among Balkan citizens, especially those in distress.

Russia uses cyber capabilities not only to steal information but also to disrupt pro-Western events, such as sabotaging virtual meetings, hacking NGO websites, or launching DDoS attacks against government sites during critical negotiations. The actions are often

accompanied by simultaneous disinformation campaigns that create doubt about the integrity of Western initiatives.

Russia has established “misinformation ecosystems” in the Balkans that consist of media outlets, Telegram channels, bot farms, and fake NGOs, all operating in a coordinated fashion to amplify disinformation. The ecosystem approach ensures that Russian narratives are not isolated but constantly reinforced across multiple platforms, creating a persistent alternative reality for Balkan audiences.

Russia also employs “lawfare” by promoting legal narratives that claim Western actions in the Balkans violate international law, NATO's charter, or UN resolutions. The tactic tries to delegitimize Western influence and presents Russia as a defender of international legality despite its aggressive actions in the region.

Russia tries to undermine civil society in the Balkans by funding anti-NGO campaigns or portraying local NGOs as “foreign agents” serving Western interests. Attacking civil society, Russia seeks to weaken grassroots movements that support democratic reforms and EU integration.

Russia collaborates with other malign actors, such as Iranian and Chinese information networks, to amplify anti-Western narratives in the Balkans. The cooperation is opportunistic but effective in creating a broader anti-Western sentiment that aligns with Russia's objectives.

Detailed timeline of Russia's disinformation, influence operations, and cognitive warfare activities in the Balkans

2008-2012--- Early Stages of Russian Influence Ops in the Balkans

- **2008---** NATO Enlargement to Albania and Croatia.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian state media and affiliated outlets launch a campaign labeling NATO's expansion as a “threat to Slavic unity” and framing the alliance as a “destabilizing force” in the region.
- **2009---** Energy Crisis and South Stream Project Promotion.

- **Disinformation Tactic---** Russia emphasizes its role as the “guarantor of energy stability” in the Balkans. The Kremlin’s narrative highlights gas pipeline projects like South Stream as vital for Balkan security while framing EU energy diversification as unreliable.
- **2011-2012---** Anti-EU Narrative in Serbian Elections.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian media in Serbia promotes narratives suggesting that joining the EU would mean losing sovereignty and cultural identity. Pro-Russian politicians receive significant coverage on RT and Sputnik’s Serbian editions.

2014--- Ukraine Conflict as a Catalyst for Balkan Influence

- **February 2014---** Annexation of Crimea.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian media compares the situation in Ukraine to Kosovo, calling “Western-orchestrated coups” and warning Balkan audiences of potential “Western interference” in domestic affairs.
- **April 2014---** Formation of Anti-NATO Narratives in Montenegro.
 - **Campaign Detail---** Russian media, led by RT and Sputnik, accuse Montenegro’s NATO accession process of being “anti-Serbian” and harmful to regional stability. Campaigns stress historic Serbian-Russian ties, with support from local Orthodox Church leaders.

2015-2017--- Intensified Disinformation and Hybrid Warfare

- **2015---** Refugee Crisis.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian media outlets portray the EU’s handling of the refugee crisis as chaotic and damaging to Balkan countries. In contrast, Russia is depicted as a defender of “traditional Christian values,” which resonates with conservative Balkan populations.
- **2016---** Attempted Coup in Montenegro (October 2016).
 - **Event---** Russian intelligence, specifically GRU Unit 29155, is linked to an attempted coup aimed at preventing Montenegro’s NATO accession.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian outlets deny involvement and instead frame the incident as a “staged coup” orchestrated by Western intelligence to discredit Russia and suppress pro-Russian elements in Montenegro.

- **2017---** North Macedonia's Name Referendum Campaign.
 - **Event---** Russia launches a disinformation campaign to derail the Prespa Agreement, which resolves North Macedonia's name dispute with Greece—a prerequisite for EU and NATO integration.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** The campaign includes fake social media accounts spreading claims that the agreement would “erase Macedonian identity” and lead to foreign domination.

2018-2019--- Election Interference and Enhanced Propaganda

- **2018---** Serbian Presidential Elections.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Pro-Russian media supports nationalist candidates and spreads narratives suggesting that pro-Western candidates are “agents of Western imperialism.”
- **2019---** Kosovo's NATO Membership Aspirations.
 - **Event---** As Kosovo ramps up efforts for NATO membership, Russian media frames this as an existential threat to Serbs in the region, calling it “militarization by Albanians” and “NATO expansionism.”
- **2019---** Formation of the Portal Kombat Network in the Balkans.
 - **Details---** Russian operatives establish over 200 proxy websites in Balkan languages, sharing disinformation about NATO, the EU, and regional politics. The sites use automated translation tools to produce local-language content quickly.

2020-2021--- Pandemic Narratives and Serbian Elections

- **2020---** COVID-19 Pandemic.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian media promote narratives that the EU is abandoning Balkan states during the pandemic while emphasizing Russian medical aid deliveries, such as sending “medical brigades” to Serbia in March 2020.
 - **Vaccine Diplomacy---** Russian outlets push Sputnik V as the “savior vaccine” while framing Western vaccines as unsafe or politically motivated.
- **2021---** Serbian Elections.

- **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian-linked social media accounts amplify nationalist messages, calling for stronger ties with Russia and critiquing EU integration. Content promotes ideas of Serbian victimhood and Orthodox solidarity with Russia.

2022-2023--- Russia's War in Ukraine and Balkan Propaganda

- **February 2022---** Russian Invasion of Ukraine.
 - **Disinformation Tactic---** Russian media in the Balkans equates the invasion of Ukraine with NATO's intervention in Kosovo in 1999, portraying as “necessary actions for regional stability” and “defensive moves” by Russia.
- **Narrative Amplification---** Local pro-Russian influencers on platforms like Telegram push the narrative that Russia is “liberating” Ukraine from Western aggression, which is likened to defending Serbia against NATO in the 1990s.
- **March 2022---** Anti-Sanctions Messaging in Serbia and Bosnia.

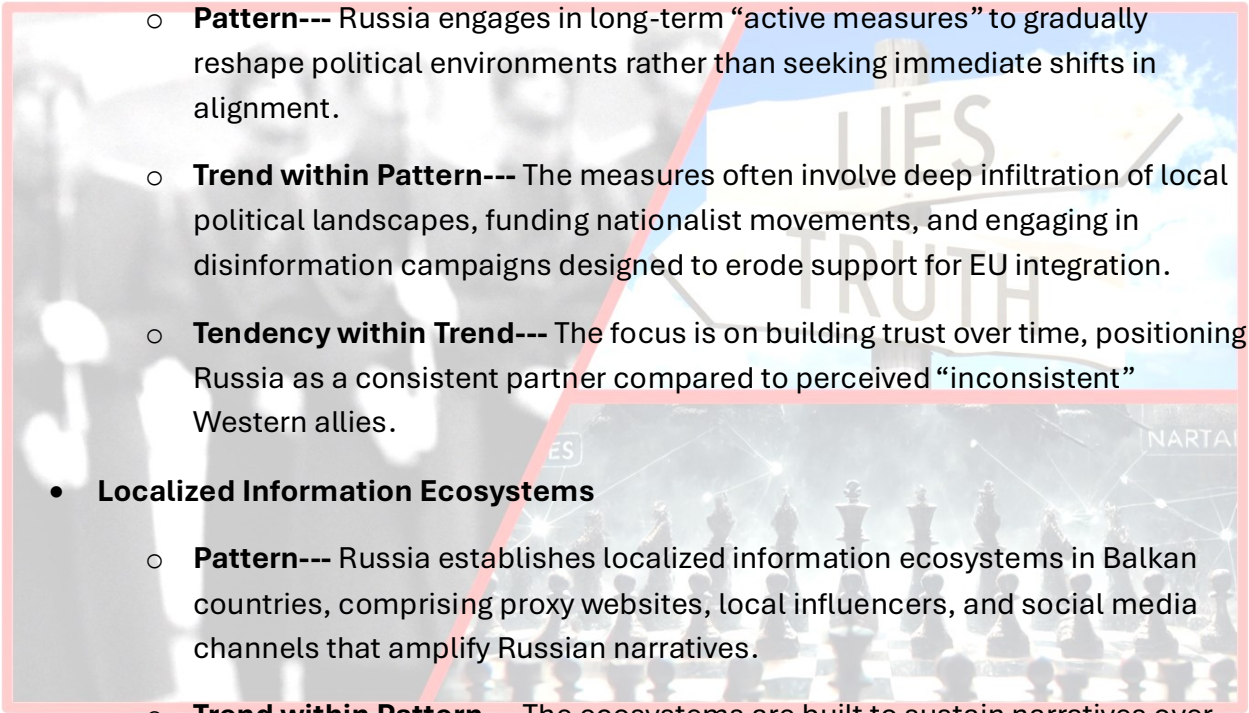

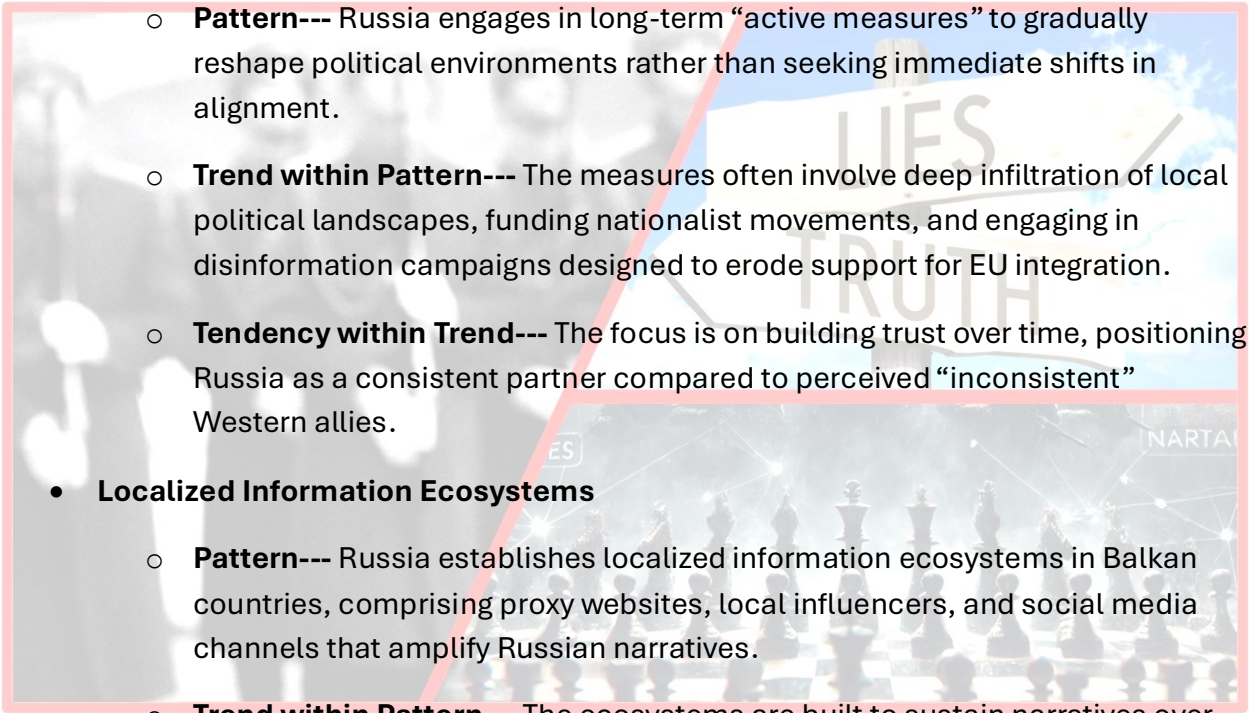

AI-generated content, such as deepfakes and synthetic voices, creates realistic yet misleading narratives that resonate deeply with local audiences. The AI techniques have allowed Russia to create fabricated videos and audio clips that depict Western leaders making inflammatory statements or local officials discussing corruption or foreign interference. Such content exploits existing fears, such as historical concerns about surveillance, making it highly believable and difficult to debunk.

In response, NATO, the EU, and Balkan states have initiated various counter-messaging strategies, though their success has been mixed. Initiatives like the EU’s “#BalkanFactCheck” campaign have effectively debunked some Russian narratives, but trust issues in rural areas have limited its reach. NATO’s efforts to emphasize shared security benefits have also faced challenges, as Russian narratives quickly label such messaging as propaganda, showing the need for more culturally aligned and credible countermeasures that can penetrate deeper into Balkan societies.

Russia's partnerships with other actors, notably China and Iran, add a layer of complexity to its influence efforts in the Balkans. The collaborations enhance Russia's strategic capabilities by amplifying shared narratives, such as portraying EU sanctions as economically damaging to Balkan nations. Chinese Confucius Institutes have also cooperated with Russian media to promote alternatives to Western models, emphasizing non-interventionist diplomacy. The partnerships allow Russia to present itself as a more culturally and historically aligned ally in the region.

Timing is critical in Russia's campaigns, as disinformation is often aligned with key geopolitical events. For example, during Montenegro's 2020 EU accession discussions, Russia emphasized narratives suggesting that joining the EU would undermine Orthodox heritage. Similarly, during NATO military drills in the region, Russia's media portrayed the exercises as aggressive moves designed to provoke conflict, framing NATO as a direct threat. The strategic alignment increases the effectiveness of disinformation and creates urgency among the local populace.

Russia's use of cultural diplomacy, media exchanges, and educational initiatives intends to reinforce pro-Russian sentiment subtly. Russian cultural centers in Serbia and Bosnia promote historical ties, while scholarships to Moscow expose students to Kremlin-approved curricula, turning them into advocates for Russian narratives upon their return. The soft power complements more direct disinformation efforts, creating long-term influence beyond immediate geopolitical events.

As digital platforms evolve, so do Russia's tactics. Russian operatives now use platforms like TikTok, Signal, and decentralized networks to distribute propaganda and coordinate proxies. The new channels allow for more significant evasion of regulatory scrutiny, making disinformation harder to trace and debunk. For example, Russian narratives have found niche audiences on decentralized networks like Mastodon, while encrypted messaging apps facilitate closed-group disinformation campaigns that exploit regional distrust of government surveillance.

Russia's disinformation is expected to target upcoming elections, EU accession discussions, and energy negotiations. AI-driven content will likely misrepresent Western leaders' positions on sensitive issues, like Kosovo's status or energy security, aiming to polarize voters. Russia may also intensify narratives predicting energy shortages due to EU sanctions, framing itself as a reliable energy partner during critical winter months.

Impact assessments show that Russian disinformation has steadily eroded support for EU integration, as evidenced by declining public opinion in Serbia from 2018 to 2022. In North Macedonia's 2020 elections, narratives about a "loss of identity" if NATO membership

proceeds contributed to increased nationalist votes, complicating negotiations with NATO and the EU. The manipulation often uses historical trauma to provoke strong emotional responses, framing the EU and NATO as modern-day colonial forces. Russia's psychological tactics also evoke traumatic events, such as NATO's 1999 bombing of Serbia, creating a mentality that favors closer ties with Moscow while increasing skepticism toward Western institutions.

Strategically, Russia will likely adapt to AI regulation in the Balkans and the EU by developing more subtle AI-driven disinformation that mimics legitimate news sources. The shift towards "invisible propaganda," where bias is embedded subtly, will aim to create subconscious anti-Western perceptions without triggering immediate fact-checking.

The broader impact of Russia's disinformation on NATO is substantial. Targeting specific NATO members and exploiting varying levels of commitment to Balkan security, Russia sows discord and undermines the alliance's collective defense credibility. The drives Balkan states to reconsider their security partnerships, potentially pivoting towards Russia. Russia's cyber operations, often combined with disinformation, exploit outdated digital infrastructure in Balkan states, weakening public trust. Modernizing these infrastructures is crucial to enhancing resilience against Russian influence.



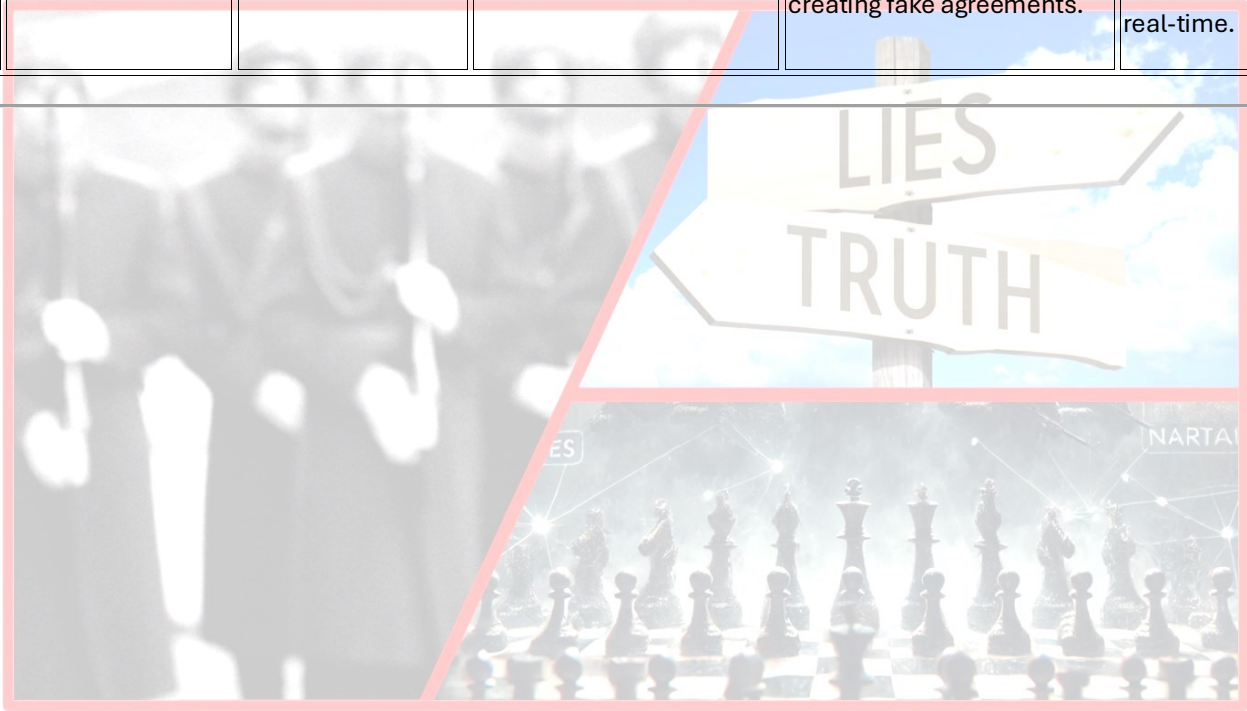

Reviving old wounds, Russia creates an "us vs. them" mentality, making Western integration appear culturally and politically alien.

Russia's use of cyber capabilities is intricately linked to its disinformation campaigns, creating synergistic effects that amplify the impact of its narratives. Combining cyber attacks—such as website defacements or data leaks—with parallel disinformation campaigns maximizes confusion, undermines trust, and hinders effective response efforts.

Russian operatives often use cyber incidents as a trigger for launching narratives about state incompetence or Western-induced instability. The approach ensures that cyber operations serve tactical disruptions and broader strategic narratives.

Russia's influence in the Balkans is characterized by a persistent gray zone presence, operating below the threshold of confrontation. Russia sustains its influence without overt involvement by maintaining plausible deniability through proxies, local media channels, and digital influencers. The ambiguity complicates attribution, making it harder for Western actors to mount clear responses. As Russia adapts to emerging platforms and technologies, its use of decentralized and encrypted networks further enhances deniability, allowing disinformation to spread with minimal risk of exposure.

Psychological manipulation is central to Russia's cognitive warfare strategy in the Balkans. Russia's narratives try to create emotional reactions rather than rational responses, exploiting fears about security, identity loss, and economic instability. The use of AI and psychographic profiling is increasingly evident, allowing for precision targeting of narratives that resonate with specific demographic groups, such as youth or rural communities. The approach deepens public distrust of Western institutions and fosters apathy or cynicism about democratic processes.

Russia's influence in the Balkans goes beyond disinformation; it includes efforts to build long-term soft power through cultural centers, educational programs, and economic investments. The initiatives complement overt disinformation by promoting a positive image of Russia as a consistent and culturally aligned partner. The strategy seeks to embed pro-Russian sentiment among key segments of Balkan societies, ensuring that disinformation has a receptive environment. As EU integration progresses, expect Russia to double down on these soft power tactics, creating a more entrenched network of influence beyond media narratives.

Elections in the Balkans are consistently targeted by Russian disinformation campaigns aimed at undermining democratic legitimacy and boosting pro-Russian candidates. Spreading narratives of electoral fraud, Western interference, or corrupt EU-backed candidates, Russia seeks to delegitimize outcomes and lower public participation. As digital tools become more advanced, expect Russia to deploy AI-driven disinformation during upcoming elections, creating more convincing yet false narratives that deepen polarization.

Energy dependency remains a critical leverage point for Russia, and it frequently exploits this in its disinformation campaigns. Framing itself as a reliable energy partner and portraying EU energy strategies as unreliable, Russia creates geoeconomic narratives that play to existing vulnerabilities in the Balkans. The narratives are reactive and designed to shape long-term

perceptions, making Russia appear a pragmatic ally against Western “economic imperialism.” Expect these narratives to intensify during energy scarcity or economic downturns, creating pressure on local governments to favor Russian energy deals.

Russia’s disinformation apparatus is highly resilient, adapting quickly to Western countermeasures like social media bans, fact-checking initiatives, or diplomatic protests. It often shifts tactics—moving from mainstream platforms to encrypted channels, altering narratives to evade detection, and using AI to generate more credible content. The adaptability means that static defenses will be insufficient; Western responses must be agile, flexible, and proactive, focusing on early detection, rapid attribution, and clear public communication to maintain credibility.

The overarching strategic objective of Russia’s disinformation in the Balkans is to stall NATO and EU integration. Russia tries to delay reform processes and complicate diplomatic efforts by fostering continuous instability, creating competing narratives, and maintaining a steady stream of false information. The “constructive chaos” ensures that Balkan states remain politically divided, economically dependent, and less aligned with Western security frameworks. Countering this requires defensive measures and sustained diplomatic engagement, economic support, and public diplomacy efforts emphasizing Western integration's tangible benefits.

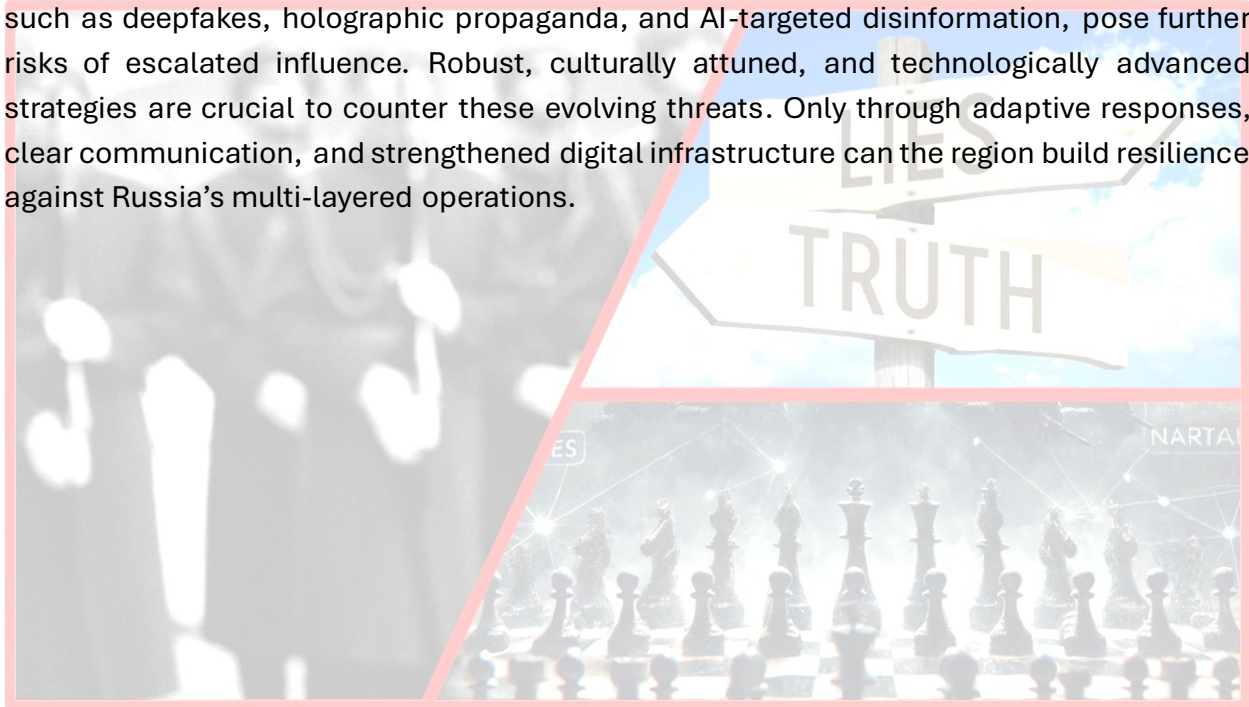
Final Strategic Implications
